

Harvills Hawthorn Home Learning Expectations

At Harvills Hawthorn Primary School, we recognise and value the contribution that learning in the home environment can make to children's education. This policy sets out the purpose and benefits of home learning as well as the guidelines we follow when setting home learning activities for our children.

What are the aims of this policy?

- To ensure consistency of approach throughout the school.
- To ensure progression towards independence and individual
- responsibility.
- To consolidate and reinforce skills.
- To extend school learning.
- To provide opportunities for parents, children and school to work in
- partnership.
- To provide opportunities for parents and children to work together to enjoy learning experiences.

What is the purpose of home learning?

- To consolidate, reinforce and extend skills.
- To provide opportunities for parents and children to work together.
- To allow parents to gain an understanding of what children are learning in school.
- To allow children to progress towards becoming more independent learners.
- To prepare Year 6 children for secondary transfer.

What is the role of the school?

- To provide parents with a clear policy regarding homework.
- To ensure this policy is fully and consistently followed.
- To provide support for parents with information about home learning.
- To provide support for children.

What is the role of the teacher?

- To plan and set home learning tasks that are appropriate to the needs of the child.
- To ensure all children understand the home learning they have been given.
- To be available to talk to parents and children about home learning.
- To inform parents if there is a problem regarding home learning.

What is the role of the parent?

- To support the child in completing home learning
- To ensure the child completes home learning to a high standard and hands it in on time.
- To provide the appropriate conditions for the child to complete the home learning.

To provide the appropriate resources for the child to complete the home learning.

What is the role of the child?

- To ensure they have everything they need to complete home learning each week.
- To make sure they understand the tasks that have been set.
- To put in the same level of effort as would be expected of class work.
- To hand the home learning in on time.

What type of home learning will be set?

At Harvills Hawthorn, we place great emphasis on the basics of maths and English, whilst also allowing children to showcase their creativity. Below, you will find a page dedicated to the home learning that will be set in each year group.

Nursery and Reception

Reading

- Children should 'read' their Bug Club phonics book with an adult at least three times per week. Children will begin on 'lilac' books, which do not contain words so 'reading' should begin by telling a story using the storytelling words provided. Once letter sounds are introduced in school, children will be given books with words in, which they can practise blending with an adult.
- Children will be given a weekly 'story-time book' that we encourage an adult to read to them before asking questions to check the child's understanding.

Phonics

• Weekly phonics learning will be set in a phonics home learning book. The book will be sent home on a Friday and will contain letter sounds that have been taught that week.

Half-termly creative task (optional)

Reading

 In order to help them become confident, fluent readers, we encourage our children to read aloud to an adult at least three times a week. This is a great opportunity to support your child's phonics learning as it provides more opportunities for them to revise and apply the blending skills taught in school.
Furthermore, by questioning them on their reading, their reading comprehension skills are being developed. When an adult has listened to the child, we ask that they

Spelling

 Starting in the spring term, children will bring home a list of common exception words each week. Common exception words are words where the usual spelling rule does not apply. As children come across unfamiliar spelling and sound patterns in these words, their phonics knowledge will not always help them to decode the word. Common exception words are those words that children need to be able to recognise so that they can read the word by sight.

Numbots (optional

• Each child has login details for Numbots. Numbots is an online learning platform that will support your child's understanding of number bonds and help improve their addition and subtraction skills. These are the essential building blocks for higher-level maths concepts. By the end of Year 1, children should be able to count in multiples of 2, 5 and 10.

Belt test facts (optional)

• Age-related basic mathematical facts are practised in school via our 'belt test' system. Children are given a set of facts to learn and these are tested weekly. When a child has achieved all of the facts for a test, they receive a mini-belt and a certificate. This system helps the children with their rapid recall of facts and removed potential barriers to solving more complex mathematical problems. At home, children could spend time learning a section of facts to help to prepare them for their weekly test.

 Age-related basic mathematical facts are practised in school via our 'belt test' system. Children are given a set of facts to learn and these are tested weekly. When a child has achieved all of the facts for a test, they receive a mini-belt and a certificate. This system helps the children with their rapid recall of facts and removed potential barriers to solving more complex mathematical problems. At home, children could spend time learning a section of facts to help to prepare them for their weekly test.

Times tables (optional)

Each child has login details for Times Tables Rock Stars. This is an online programme where children can practise their times tables and compete with themselves and others. By the end of Year 4, children should be able to recall x and ÷ facts for all times tables up to 12 x 12. In the summer term of Year 4, the children will sit a national Multiplication Tables Check (MTC). In preparation for this test, your child could access the URBrainy multiplication check page (https://urbrainy.com/mtc). This site is free of charge so you do not have to register or pay.

Belt test facts (optional)

• Age-related basic mathematical facts are practised in school via our 'belt test' system. Children are given a set of facts to learn and these are tested weekly. When a child has achieved all of the facts for a test, they receive a mini-belt and a certificate. In Year 6, our key focus is preparing children for secondary school. At secondary school, children will receive numerous pieces of home learning each week and they must be able to manage their time effectively to ensure that they are completed and returned on time. In Year 6, we take a number of different approaches to home learning at different points in the year.

- Each child will receive a reading CGP booklet. Each Monday, a reading task will be set. This must be completed and returned to school on the Friday.

Harvills' Way to Fly

In the Spring term, Year 6 children begin Harvills' Way to Fly. This programme is devised to help your child achieve their best possible results in their SATs. Each week, the children will be given pre-learning for maths and spelling, punctuation and grammar (SPaG). This learning will be knowledge organisers or revision sheets that the children must read and understand as it will be the focus for in-school learning the following week. Early in the Spring term, there will be a parent meeting so that Harvills' Way to Fly can be introduced.
